

Nature Jumble

Did you know that there are 11 species of bumble bees in Illinois? These amazing native pollinators eat nectar and pollen from a variety of flowers. At the end of summer, a bumble bee queens burrows below the soil to survive the winter. Leaving leaves, grasses, and a few dead limbs in your yard helps supports bumble bee habitats and populations!

INSTRUCTIONS:


1. Print off this sheet on regular or heavy weight paper.

4. Yay! Now you are ready to put the pieces back together to complete the image!













INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Cut out the desired template and glue the design onto a sheet of heavyweight paper or fabric and cut away the excess.
- 2. Carefully cut out the eye holes and punch the side holes reserved for the string.
- 3. Loop string through the holes and adjust to fit.
- 4. Now your woodland mask is ready to wear! Pair your mask with a fun outfit and begin your imaginative adventures!



Great Horned Owl

The great horned owl (*Bubo virginianus*), has distinctive tufts of feathers or "horns" on each side of its head. It can be recognized by its unique call, "hoo, hoo-oo, hoo, hoo." This owl is a permanent resident across the state of Illinois.

Raccoon


The raccoon (*Procyon lotor*), with its distinctive black fur mask is an amazing climber and is mainly active at night. The raccoon's diet changes throughout the seaons and they can live up to 16 years. Raccoons can be found statewide in Illinois.

Eastern Fox Squirrel

The eastern fox squirrel (Sciurus niger), with its long and bushy tail is a familiar species in neighborhoods. With their rust-yellow body fur and light orange-yellow fur belly, this busy squirrel is a permanent resident throughout Illinois.

Phases of the Moon


EXPLORING THE NIGHT SKY

INSTRUCTIONS:

1. Cut out the cards below on the solid line. 2. Glue or tape them onto a heavy weight paper to add strength and trim off the excess. You can also choose to laminate them by covering both sides of the card with clear packing tape to make them waterproof.

3. Take a walk through your your backyard, neighborhood or park to fill your bingo card. 4. Use small clips, clothespins, or a pencil to mark off the items you discover. If you laminated your cards, a crayon works great for recording your discoveries and it also can be wiped away easily for your next adventure!
