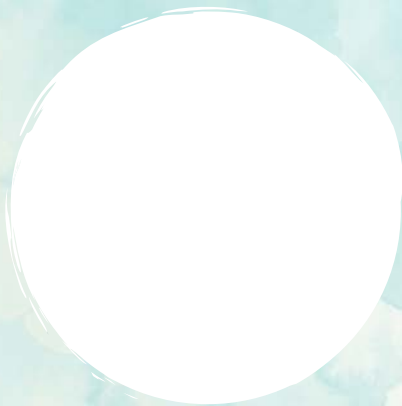
NOTICING THE SEASONAL SHIFT

Did you know?

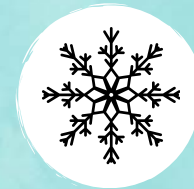

1. Print off a copy of this page. It includes both the cover and one page insert.
2. Print as many additional insert pages (found on the second PDF page) as you'd like for your winter journal.

4. Assemble your journal by placing your pages inside the cover. Staple or stitch along the solid line to complete your journal.
